

Dear Padre,

Why do we say "Holy Mary, Mother of God" when she's the mother of Jesus?

The first Christians did call Mary the "Mother of Jesus." The title "Mother of God" wasn't formally defined in the Church's history until the First Council of Ephesus in 431. Around the year 250, the hymn Sub Tuum Presidium ("We Fly to Thy Patronage") appeared, which refers to Mary as the Mother of God. Why did it take so long for the early Church to decide how to refer to Jesus' Mother? What we call Mary is tied to how we understand Jesus' identity as the fully human and fully divine Son of God. The Church understood Jesus as a person



of the Trinity, the Son of God, who uniquely possesses both fully human and fully divine natures. In a nutshell, you can't separate the "man" Jesus from the "God" Jesus. In clarifying what it meant to say that Jesus is the Son of God, equally one with the Father and the Holy Spirit and yet fully human and "like us in all things but sin," the Church had to answer the question of how Mary fit into the work of salvation. Mary was the Mother of the Son of God; she was not only the Mother of Jesus' human nature. When Catholics call Mary the "Mother of God," they state their belief that Jesus is a single person—the Son of God—and that Mary is his Mother.

Dear St. Mary's Parish Members and Knights of Columbus,

Rejoice in the Risen Christ! Alleluia! I apologize for the lateness in this thank you letter, especially as the parish is so supportive of me and my community. I have been told by several sisters the support that the parish and individual members have given these past two years is very unusual for someone in formation, but I feel it is a reflection of the role St. Mary's has played in my life. It is not just the financial support, but also all the love and prayers that help me continue in my journey.

It has been a busy two months since I ended my canonical year in February. We celebrated Holy Week and the Triduum, and our Choir Chapel was fullest I have ever seen it for Easter Sunday. I am combining the Benedictine values ora et labora, work and prayer, outside of the community. I started a new job with Highland Community College as their Allied Health Coordinator in March. I oversee the nurse aide, medication aide and EMT programs throughout Northeast Kansas. Highland Community College has the largest coverage in the state for community colleges, covering 9 counties, with campuses in Atchison (Tech Center), Wamego and Baileyville (Western Center). The courses I oversee have classes at the campuses as well as a few high schools throughout the area, and clinicals in facilities as far west as Marysville. My office is at the Tech Center here in Atchison, so I am blessed to be able to be present at prayers and sometimes get to go home for lunch, but I will have to travel a little bit to the other campuses. It is such a joy for me to be able to serve in the rural Kansas communities, as well as helping to encourage high school students and adults in furthering their education. I continue to also carry out the ministry of the care of the sick, which St. Benedict tells us, "Care of the elderly and sick must come before all else." (RB 36)

Here at the Mount, we have been busying implementing an action plan for the Laudato Si Platform, which "empowers the universal Church and all people of good will to respond to Laudato Si', Pope Francis' encyclical." The platform encourages families, parishes and dioceses, educational institutes, healthcare organizations, economic entities, organizations and groups, and religious orders to address seven areas that Pope Francis has identified in the care of our common home: response to the cry of the Earth and to the cry of the Poor; ecological economics, education, and spirituality; adoption of sustainable lifestyles; and community resilience and empowerment. One thing that has resulted out of our action plan is the Merrywood Garden, a community garden to help serve the needs of Atchison. This first year, the produce grown will go to Catholic Charities for distribution, but we hope to expand for individual community plots.

Even though I am working outside the monastery, I continue to serve the community in a variety of ways through liturgical, hospitality, technology and cleaning ministries. I help one of our sisters with technology so she can host hybrid oblate meetings six times a year here at the Mount. At her last meeting, we had oblates (associates) from coast to coast. It's such a joy that technology helps us stay in contact with so many and continue to share our Benedictine spirituality and hospitality, as well as a chance for me to get to know our oblates.

Please know that you are remembered in community and my prayers as well. You are always welcome to send special prayer requests, and that that you are welcome to come and visit, except on the first Sundays of each month, when we have our Sabbath Sundays, a time of silence, in our community. Our Sunday mass is at 10:15 am. Please continue to keep me in your prayers as I continue on this journey that God is calling me to. This summer I will be moving out of the novitiate into a different living group, and I hope to go before the community this fall to request to make first vows, as I feel God is continuing to call me to religious life.
